Cerith Wyn Evans 'No realm of thought...No field of vision' 7 February – 19 April 2020 Preview: Thursday 6 February, 6 – 8pm White Cube Bermondsey

White Cube Bermondsey is pleased to present 'No realm of thought...No field of vision', an exhibition of new work by Cerith Wyn Evans. Featuring installation, sculpture and painting installed throughout the gallery, it foregrounds the artist's longstanding exploration of transcendence, translation and perception where elements such as text, code, light, sound and time are compressed, extended, inverted and multiplied.

In this exhibition, Evans draws upon the combined potential and erotic resonance of early mechanised sculptural forms, such as the first self-propelled flight machines or Duchamp's iconic sculptures, *The Bride Stripped Bare by Her Bachelors, Even (The Large Glass)* (1915-1923) and *Bicycle Wheel* (1913). In the North Gallery, '*Folds...in shade (also light and shade)*' takes the form of three large Japanese 'byobu' screens, featuring multiple glass panels that are fissured and cracked across their surfaces. Displayed alongside, three mobile sculptures which feature curved, shattered vehicle windscreens equally embrace the idea of compromise as a potentially creative element.

A number of major neon works are suspended throughout the exhibition. In 9 x 9 x 9, 'Fig (O)' takes its form from the early twentieth century helicopter design by Paul Cornu, integrated with a drone and a satellite probe. Cutting across South Gallery II, a wall of neon Japanese Kanji characters are a further translation of a passage from Marcel Proust's novel 'À la recherche du temps perdu', which evocatively describes an eighteenth century fountain. Finally, '...take Apprentice in the Sun' refers to a series of photographs the artist took of Duchamp's Bicycle Wheel (1913), and the shadows it cast, on display at MoMA, New York.

Evans' largest solo exhibition to date, "....the Illuminating Gas", is currently on view at Pirelli HangarBicocca in Milan until 23 February 2020. The exhibition presents twenty-four works, including early sculptures, monumental installations and new artworks.
